April 15th Public Comment on Rules and Regs

There will be public meeting on April 15 from 6pm - 7pm, at Embassy Suites in Loveland to get public comment on the rules created by the State Division of Reclamation and Mining Safety related to legislation HB 1161 and SB 228. These bills require that the public should know when a mining company is prospecting to do mining. The purpose of the April 15 meeting is to make public comment that the rules adhere to the spirit of these bills.

The MLRB held a Pre-Hearing Conference April 13th in preparation for the upcoming formal rulemaking hearings.

Some updates: The 4 public meetings in Loveland (April 15), Grand Junction (May 13), Salida (May 26), and Denver (June 10), will be for public comments by non-parties only.

This means that we would benefit from having a large turnout of affected landowners, local government officials, regular people, and others to show up and let the Board know their thoughts on the proposed rules at each of these meetings.

The formal hearings where argument by parties will occur will be over a 2 or 3 day span in Denver in late June or July. At that point, the Board will vote on whether to make any changes and to adopt a final rule package.

As far as public comments, individualized comments are the best, but ideas for main themes are:

- **Support for the rules as written**
- **Reject industry attempts to weaken ground water protections –the statute is clear, don't allow changes**
- **Reject industry attempts to exclude the public and local governments from the pre-mining approval process**
- **The Board should expressly provide for Board review of prospecting and baseline characterization plan approvals**

This Month "April" in the History of CARD

It was a spring day on the 13th of April, 2007 that the founders of CARD met with Lane Douglas (the then project manager of the Powertech Centennial project) and George Robinson of R-Squared for the first time. These landowners who had recently been informed of how Powertech planned to mine for uranium on the land they called home had met a couple of times prior to this meeting and were already organizing an effort to get the word out about Powertech's plans.

In fact, the first CARD Town Hall meeting was also in April of 2007. The name CARD was not part of this organized group of landowners yet, but the www.nunnglow.com website was already up and running.

Lane and George had no idea what type of people they were meeting with and were surprised with the backgrounds of the locals. This particular group of affected landowners possessed backgrounds in Civil Engineering, Computer Science, a Botanist whose PhD. thesis was on the effects of selenium from uranium mining on plants and animals, and a Chemist who at the time worked for a local water quality testing lab.

The questions that were posed to Powertech and their group of scientists by this group of country folks have still not been answered satisfactorily enough to help us feel that their proposed ISL mining project will not contaminate the drinking water of Northern Colorado.
